How lovely it's been this summer and Lowen sums it up more eloquently and emphatically than any words! Read more about him in Catherine Burford's volunteer view.



altogether, and are more occasions for great laughter for Sylvia and me!


I love the photo of Sylvia and Jack in their jumpers, it just sums up my 2 great friends, introduced to me by The Cinnamon Trust."

"Having once owned a dog (Saffi) who we lost when she was 13 I know what joy they can bring. We have not felt able to have another dog as found the heartbreak too much to bear. We now have 2 cats, but I'm a dog lover 100% and when out walking with my husband I gravitate towards dogs and fall in love easily.

Before moving to Steyning, my neighbour got a rescue Springer Spaniel called Herbie. She and her husband both worked Monday to Friday, but she was part-time. I offered to let him out for a wee and she agreed and gave me a key. Well, it went further, and I asked if I could walk him. We had so much fun together; he was just the loveliest dog and we had a great bond. Sadly, he was diagnosed with cancer and, because he was in pain, my neighbours made the right decision to say goodbye. As time ticked on, a friend suggested I volunteer to walk dogs as I try to get out every day for an hours walk - walking with a dog is an extra bonus. So, I applied to The Cinnamon Trust and after checks I was accepted.



Buddy and Holly belong to Anne who, sadly, is housebound she hadn't managed to get the dogs out for a walk for a number of months. I was a little worried about walking 2 dogs, but they are both just so gentle and absolute angels. During our first walk they seemed emotionless, a bit tubby, and Buddy stumbled quite a bit because of arthritis - but he doesn't whine he just presses on.

A year on when I pull up in my car they both start barking and, when I ring the doorbell and Anne finds their leads, Buddy literally sings with excitement! I walk

them for 45 minutes to an hour because I feel that's enough. With Anne's permission, I take their leads off when we are away from traffic and they are just so good. They sense when their leads need to be put back on and stand waiting. Buddy loves water and, whenever possible, he is straight in for a dip. Holly will if it's hot, but not so keen in colder weather. They both greet other dogs gently, with lovely wagging tails.

Anne adores her dogs. They are her only company as she lost her long-term

partner just before Christmas who was in a care home some miles away. With Covid, she wasn't able to visit, and has no close family so she is very lonely. I take her up a roast every Monday with a home cooked cake and, if we have something for dinner I think she may like, I do enough for her also.

On Christmas Day 2020 I knew she was alone so I took her up a dinner, pudding, gifts for the dogs and a hamper, too. I turned up with my Christmas jumper and jingle bell hat on which made her smile. On Boxing Day she got cold meats with pickles and salad. I get much joy out of walking her two lovely dogs, but I find I enjoy spoiling Anne also. I've moved house now and live 20 minutes away but I won't stop waking them as they are a big part of my life now.

If, like me, you have spare time, love dogs and walking, why not do the two together and make a difference to dogs and owners. The Cinnamon Trust work closely with the owners which is so reassuring."



From the West Midlands Kathy Jary's view is rather special!

"I've been walking Eddie since November 2019. I had been looking for a way that I could help in my local community, and as I've always loved dogs, The Cinnamon Trust sounded perfect! I applied and was paired with John, who is so lovely and a wonderful owner to Eddie, but is sadly unable to take him out on walks.

Myself and 2 other brilliant volunteers, Natalie and Janet, walk Eddie so he gets 5 walks a week and he loves every minute of them; he's 8 years old now, but absolutely full of beans!

Eddie is the sweetest dog, and everyone that meets him loves him. Walking him is always the



highlight of the day, and it has given me the confidence to explore my local area I never would have found so many beautiful fields and canals without him as a reason to go exploring. He's also helped keep me fit by being a wonderful motivation to get off the sofa, knowing he is there waiting for me whatever the weather!

Eddie and John have a brilliant relationship; one evening I arrived to walk Eddie, but John was feeling under the weather and the doctor had been called out. Eddie must have been able to tell something was wrong, as he is always SO

excited to go for his walks but on this evening he would not leave John's side. It was really amazing to see how in tune Eddie was with how John was feeling. Fortunately, the next time I visited, John was feeling better and Eddie was ready and raring to go again!

I enjoy walking Eddie so much that I always talk about it - one of my colleagues has now also signed up with The Cinnamon Trust and absolutely loves walking the dog she has been paired with, too!

A salutary tale now from **John Dennison** in Shropshire:

"Oh, no! They've asked me if I'll walk a Staffordshire Bull Terrier! (Confessions of an opinionated dog-walker, by John Dennison).

We choose dogs to fit our self-image, don't we? Mine just had to be a Pointer – highly intelligent, friendly, placid disposition, athletic – a canine version of me, in fact! Equally the dogs we'd prefer not to be seen with – in my case those yappy little numbers like Yorkshire Terriers, Toy Poodles and Lhasa Apsos, or Staffordshire Bull Terriers with attitude!

Then, a dear friend died and left me a Yorkshire Terrier to look after! Matti and I spent a winter together in a log cabin in Lapland. Was he a one-off, or are all Yorkies such brilliant companions? Matti had all the heart and resilience of dogs twice his size.

Later, in a rash move, I married a lady who was NOT a dog-lover, barely dog-friendly. That's when I turned to The Cinnamon Trust. The first dog they found for me to walk was (the irony of it!) a Toy Poodle called Oscar. But there was nothing 'toy' about Oscar, apart from his size. Every day, we'd climb Carn Marth together, before he turned to fly back down the track, legs hardly touching the ground, ears flapping for extra lift, full of joy. As his owner, Christine's, cancer advanced, Oscar and I spent more and more time together until he was eventually re-homed with Christine's family. Thank you, Oscar and Christine for my fond memories of a Toy Poodle!

Walking Whisky, the scruffiest, gentlest German Shepherd, crossed with who-knows-what, had gone a long way to restoring my street-cred in the local village. Then, I was introduced to Charlie – one of those powder-puffy Lhasa Apsos. "No, no, he's not *my dog!*" was my quick response to "I see you've got a new dog". Charlie had been told, and now clearly believed, that he was the best 'looker'

around. He flaunted himself shamelessly in front of poor Angus, a local farm dog who could only dream of a brush or scented shampoo. And yet, in spite of myself, I found I was now becoming fond of a Lhasa Apso!

My biggest challenge, though, was yet to come. "Oh, no! They've asked me if I'll walk a Staffordshire Bull Terrier!" My wife was as disapproving as I was of this 'notorious' breed. And the added "she's not good with other dogs" didn't help either. To cut a long story short, though, I ended up walking Leena for is it 5 or 6 years now? Leena learnt early on that I was quite relaxed with the other dogs we met, that we didn't need to avoid them, and that, because I had the situation under control, she wouldn't be called on to fend of a possible attack. I also became confident that she'd come when called, so she spent more time off the lead – something that she had never experienced before. She made friends with a puppy down the road who hadn't been told that Staffies were meant to be aggressive. It was delightful to see her in the playful company of another dog – something she had been starved of for so long. Leena was an affectionate and loving companion to the very end. Following Joan's death, The Trust moved quickly to find Leena a new home, and I had no reservation in assuring her new 'owner' that she would make him a faithful and very loving companion.

Moral: Don't let a prejudice limit your opportunity to be pleasantly surprised!"

"'Lee and I first volunteered with The Cinnamon Trust in January 2019. We had always wanted to have a dog of our own, but soon realised that with our current, busy lifestyle - both working full time jobs and often out in the evenings - we really weren't able to consider this. What we could offer though, was time at the weekend and an outdoorsy lifestyle.

We would often walk past The Cinnamon Trust HQ in Hayle and realised that volunteering would provide the perfect opportunity of being able to form a bond with a dog, but not have the responsibilities that come with ownership.

We were introduced to Janet and her dog, Lowen, in April 2019 and asked to help after she unfortunately suffered a stroke. Lowen is a 12-year-old Springer Spaniel and a bundle of mischievous energy. He has come to know





our car and can be found eagerly waiting for us at the garden gate as we approach. He enjoys a lot of attention before bounding off and pulling us along behind him!

His main love is the water. He enjoys repeatedly jumping in to rivers and streams, but gets most excited when he realises that we're heading for the beach. If there are any children playing in the water, then there's only one way of getting him back home. wading in after him! Lowen loves to play fetch but has not quite grasped the point of returning the ball. Sometimes we have had to admit defeat as he clings

on to his prized ball all the way back home.

During lockdown, Lowen had the time of his life. The usual busy Cornish beaches were deserted and for the first couple of months, we were available to take him out every day. It wasn't just Lowen that benefitted from this. The ability to experience this freedom when so many were confined to their homes was a boost to both of us mentally.

We have built a great relationship with Janet, enjoying many a garden chat and hearing what antics Lowen has been up to next. One particular incident that stays in my mind was after one of our very first walks (before coronavirus was even heard of). I went in to Janet's kitchen to wash my hands and turned round to find Lowen with a kitchen carving knife between his teeth, running around thinking it was a game! Luckily bribery with treats can work wonders in such instances. No food is ever safe when Lowen is around, he can sniff out anything that might be remotely edible and poor Janet has to deal with the consequences! If he thinks he might be deserving of a treat, he will offer each paw and look at you in such a way until you give in to his cuteness. We feel completely manipulated! It's impossible to get annoyed with him when he runs up to you, tongue hanging out and so obviously very happy with life.

Having the friendship with Janet has been an added bonus to volunteering. We contact her via WhatsApp and have been impressed with her grasp of the emojis! We had so many great photos of Lowen last year that we made them in to a calendar for her as a Christmas present (and kept a copy for ourselves, too!).

If there was anyone considering becoming a volunteer but were unsure whether they could offer the time, I would say to just go for it and make that first step. There is absolutely no pressure to do more than you are able to, you just fit in the days and times that you can and the rewards for everyone are well worth it."

Don and Chris Wing in Devon write:

"I have been a Volunteer for The Trust since June 2011 and have met lovely owners and felt privileged to walk their gorgeous dogs. There haven't been many because I've been lucky to stay with the same owners and dogs for many years, usually until their personal circumstances change. My husband, on retirement in 2017, also became a Volunteer. This was so there was always one of us to walk the dog and not let any owner down. Thankfully, this is very rare as we tend to dog walk together.

When the first lockdown happened in March 2020, we were very pleased to be categorised as keyworkers so we could continue our dog walking. However, for the first 6 weeks, we did refrain from walking to ensure we had no COVID symptoms. During that time we purchased our own leads and plenty of poo bags as well as a lot of sanitiser. We continue to carry out this practice to this day and will do so for a long time yet.

After those 6 weeks, what a joy it was to see the owners again (on the doorstep at a safe distance) and the very excited dogs! Both the owners we walk for were pleased to see us too, especially as they are both very vulnerable and were subject to shielding! Moreover, the fact that we could get out of the house due to volunteering for The Trust also helped both of us get through what has been an awful time for everyone.

This is one of the dogs my husband and I walk. He's Gryph, the Griffon (yes, I

know what you're thinking but he was named before his owner knew he was a Griffon!) who lives near Griffon Way (you couldn't make this up!). When we had the email in July 2017 asking for help to walk him, we were already walking one dog once a week and another 3 or 4 times a week so not a lot of time for other things but, in the end, we said we would cover one morning a week for a short time. Soon after, circumstances changed for the dog we were walking once a week and here we are, 4 years later, with Gryph and his owner now part of our life.

When we originally looked up what a Griffon was, we found pictures of small, Terrier type dogs but when we met Gryph found he is a mixture and definitely not a toy breed of dog - his mother was a Collie! He is 15 this year, always so excited to see us and still strong, stubborn and energetic, although in certain weathers, his hips make him 'waddle' a





little. We walk him usually on a Monday morning and he likes to follow a set walk around where he lives. We do try to deviate and there are many battles of wills, but all I can say is neither myself nor my husband win! As his owner got him as a puppy whilst living in France, Gryph still responds to his owner when she speaks French to him! One clever dog!

There are two other Trust volunteers who walk Gryph, so we decided to start a WhatsApp group at the start of the pandemic in order to stay in touch, with the hope that we could meet face to face at some stage. This has since been nicknamed 'Gryph's Girls' and, as well as keeping in touch, it enables us to cover each other in cases of ill health, holidays, appointments, etc. rather than having to bother contacting The Trust. Gryph's owner laughingly refers to me as Mr G's social secretary because I tend to be the one who talks to our group to arrange cover, vet appointments, order tablets and book the hated visit to the groomers. These photos are before (with ducky) and after the visit in May 2021 and we all tell him it was worth it to look extra handsome! He is such a character and we all love him."



A fun view (and a great picture) from **Gordon Sayle** in East Sussex:

"I heard about The Cinnamon Trust from a friend who volunteers. I thought it would be the perfect way to combine my love of animals and also give back to the community after what has been a very tough 18 months for some people.

The process to become a volunteer was easy and quick and it wasn't long before I was asked to walk Ben, a Jack Russell/Yorkie cross. Ben has older fur parents who struggle to give him the daily walks that he needed, so I agreed to meet him. His owner, Carol, was concerned that he wouldn't go with me and was surprised when he came willingly, jumped in the driver's seat of the car and wouldn't budge! Our first walk was along the seafront in Hastings - lots of new smells and places to explore! I dropped Ben off and arranged to walk him 3 times a week going



forward. I have 2 pugs, Lily and Percy, and I suggested that we walk them all together, along with my mother in law's giant Pug, Tig. We affectionately call this group 'the grumble'. Carol told me that he loved Pugs, so that sealed the deal!

I picked Ben up and met up with my wife and mother in law and the grumble and we wandered down to the seafront with coffee for us and treats for them. They all got on well, so Ben was made an honorary member of the grumble! My wife couldn't resist getting a picture of them all together after enjoying their treats. They have walked together a few times since and Ben has popped into our house whilst waiting for the Pugs to get ready. He feels like part of the family already."



To West Sussex now and Michelle Beckett.

"I moved down to the Bognor area in September 2018 and in November I started volunteering for The Cinnamon Trust. I have always enjoyed voluntary work, it helped me get out and about in an area new to me and with work I do not have time to own my own dog.

Quizzy's owner lives just a block from the sea, my happy place. I work with animals everyday but have not spent a lot of time with German Shepherds. They are a very loyal breed and Quizzy took to me very quickly, to the point now she will sit in the porch and whine when she is expecting me. Even when I moved to buy a house which is further away, I still have continued to go and walk Quizzy because I love my time with her.

Quizzy and I enjoy our walks down to the beach, especially when the tide is out and there's lots of sand to walk on. Quizzy likes to run in and out of the sea, whatever time of the year, and she is always wanting to carry something in her mouth or throw something around. Many a time I have been



splattered with wet sand when she's run around shaking seaweed about. You would not know she has recently turned 10 years old.

During COVID furlough time, as a single person living on my own, I walked Quizzy 2 or 3 times per week. This helped me during a very tough time and meant Jean also had some human contact on days when her family (who were working with the public) could not visit. Quizzy is a part of my life now, I make time to walk her once a week and I look forward to her happiness when I turn up - and our walks by the sea.

The Cinnamon Trust is a fantastic charity that helps so many people and animals and is rewarding to volunteer for. They are fantastically set up to check in on you regularly – you get terrific support as a volunteer and I highly recommend them as a charity to volunteer for."

Lesley Andreassen in Devon writes:

"I have been a volunteer puppy socialiser for several years now but when our last dog 'graduated' we decided to have a break from having a full-time dog for a while. Inevitably I missed it.... not just having a dog in the house, but also the companionship out on walks. I heard about The Cinnamon Trust through one of my fellow socialisers and decided to apply to be a dog walker. At around the same time, Covid-19 struck and I found myself working from home, so was able to be much more flexible.



I was soon matched with a lovely 7-year-old Cockerpoo called Dolly and her owner, Anna, who lived literally around the corner. We met in the park a couple of times so Dolly could give me the once over – I'm happy to say she approved and then I was on my own.

At first, Dolly was a little reluctant to say the least – Anna hadn't been able to give her the long walks she was used to for some time, so she had put on a bit of weight and got used to a pretty leisurely life at home. However, she soon started looking forward to my visits and greets me with a very waggy tail and a game of 'paw' (over and over again!).

It's fair to say Dolly takes things at a more leisurely pace than the pups I am used to training but I love taking her out – even in torrential rain which certainly doesn't bother her. We are lucky enough to have woods with a beautiful river locally and that is our favourite walk. We now head there 3 times a week for about an hour – she particularly loves the river and would happily sit in it forever!

Anna and I often have a chat before and after our walks and, although it is early days for us, we have become firm friends. A bonus is that while walking by with Dolly, I've got to know her gardening neighbours who have already given me loads of plant advice and supplied me with some cuttings!

The Cinnamon Trust is an absolute winner for me – it allows me to get to know and walk a lovely dog, make new friends (not just Anna and her neighbours, but all the dog walkers I see out and about) and get some exercise while doing it. I'd recommend this to anyone."



Malcolm Fretwell in Bedfordshire writes:

"I have been walking Monty for his owner, Margaret, for just over 2 years. I clearly remember our first meeting. The entrance to Margaret's home is on the side of the house so I had to go through the front gate to get to it. I knocked on the front door and heard a loud bark. A moment later, a giant dog appeared around the rear corner of the house heading straight for me at full speed; and went straight to my hand in which I was holding a treat, sniffing it with great interest. That sums up Monty's character, a big friendly giant of a dog who is happy to meet everyone, especially if you have a treat!



He is a very handsome boy and moves with a grace that belies his size. I'm a keen photographer and he has become one of my favourite 'models'. I am pleased to be able to capture these memories for Margaret. He is now 10 years' old but still has a puppy side which means he believes he can still run around with the younger dogs, but then sufferers for it later. Something common to many of us middle aged males!

At the beginning of May this year Margaret had a small accident which meant she ended up in hospital. As well as being a dog walker for The Cinnamon Trust, I am also a short-term fosterer, so Monty came to stay with us until Margaret was ready to return home. We had recently started to long-term foster a Terrier/Poodle mix for the RSPCA who we walked with Monty and they got on well together.

We were pleased that while he obviously missed Margaret, Monty settled in well with us quickly - probably in large part because he already knew us and he had our other foster dog for company in the house and on walks. We discovered that Nicky, his other Cinnamon Trust walker, lives close to us so she was able to maintain contact with him and would come to our house on Thursdays to walk him.

I was already a home-based worker before COVID. My working day involves online meetings and delivering training sessions. Both dogs would usually sleep while the meetings were happening, but came to recognise my tone of voice when I was coming to the end of a meeting. They would appear next to me immediately the call ended; the Terrier/Poodle mix to be stroked and Monty, with his favourite tug of war toy in mouth, demanding I grab the opposite end.

Thankfully, Margaret was able to return home at the beginning of June with Monty following shortly afterwards. We have now returned to the previous walking routine, and I look forward to this continuing for a long time to come."

"Having signed up with The Cinnamon Trust a few years ago for dog walking, short and long term fostering, Amber is my 10th Cinnamon Trust dog.

We recently sadly said farewell to our littlest Cinnamon Trust pet, Toy Yorkie Sally. We'd been long term fostering for 3+ years so were feeling the 'empty home' syndrome. We kept in regular contact with The Cinnamon Trust staff, for updates on the wellbeing of Amber's owner and to pass on news about Amber for her owner, David. The Cinnamon Trust even printed a photo of Amber to send to the hospital for David.

We wait to hear the next steps and are encouraging all

our dog friends in the area to sign up and volunteer with The Cinnamon Trust to walk Amber when/if she returns back to her own home."

"Having had our dog for 5 years, my wife suggested we sign up as volunteers for



The Cinnamon Trust, which I did with my daughter in April 2019. After a couple of weeks, Sherry contacted us to walk a Labrador cross called Barney (9 years old). Coincidently, we have got a Labrador cross rescue dog ourselves!

Julia Possener, her family and **Bouncer**, all in Lancashire, have been camping....

"We took our long term Cinnamon Trust foster dog Bouncer camping this May bank holiday weekend from Lancaster to North Derbyshire. Bouncer loves car

journeys and all the smells out the window. He had his own sun shelter and he loved it! Bouncer is a Chinese Crested Powder Puff and I walked him for his owner as my first volunteer role. His owner had had Bouncer since a puppy, but in later life had become very poorly.

It gave his previous owner tremendous comfort to know Bouncer was going to be loved and cared for by The Cinnamon Trust and that she knew where he was going to live. I carried on walking Bouncer until his owner passed away, so they could spend as long as possible together. When



the end came, Bouncer came to live with me and my family on a long term basis.

He has brought us all so much joy including my own elderly mother who sadly passed away earlier this year. She had spent all her life fearful of dogs until she met Bouncer! He was also poorly himself last year and in severe pain with his neck. With the help of The Trust and, in particular Sarah Owen, Bouncer had significant surgery. He was very brave and followed all the orders of the vet following the operation. It was a complete success and has given him his bounce back."



Hannibal is a cat who appreciates fine culture as **Jo Swift** in Devon explains:

"We had planned for a quiet Christmas in the midst of the pandemic storm, with no visitors, no family and, to be honest, not a lot of fun. Then we received a call

from Debbie at The Cinnamon Trust asking if we were interested in fostering Hannibal – a 10-year-old cat whose owner had sadly passed away. Initially I made a weak attempt to put my foot down on the grounds that we are now encouraging birds in the garden, but Debbie explained he is an indoor cat. While she spoke, I found her email with a picture of Hannibal gazing out of the screen with the confidence of an emperor, telling me our home was his destiny. So, by the time my husband came home, he had little choice in the matter!

This is just lovely from **Denise** and **Glen Read** in Essex.

"Dizzy first came into our lives about 4 years ago when I first volunteered for The Trust. Along with 2 other dogs locally, I used to walk Dizzy once or twice a week



in line with other walkers taking their turn. From the first time we were introduced there appeared to be a special bond. This was verified by Wendy, her mum. She said to me on numerous occasions that Dizzy was different around me than she was with the other walkers, especially when I arrived to pick her up.

As Wendy's health deteriorated and she had more frequent visits to the hospital, The Trust asked me if I could look after Dizzy so we have had her a few times for a sleepover! As it started to become apparent that Wendy's condition was terminal, her main priority was what would happen to Dizzy

when she could no longer look after her. Wendy spoke to The Trust and they put her mind at rest. Both The Cinnamon Trust and Wendy knew that I adored her and I was asked if I would take Dizzy when the time came! How could I say no? I just had to clear it with my husband, but I knew there wouldn't be any problems - he too adored Dizzy, as she did him!

Toward the end of Wendy's life she could no longer care for Dizzy, so she came to us, but every night we would FaceTime so that she could see and hear what Dizzy

had been up to. Sadly, Wendy soon succumbed to her illness, so the process of long-term fostering started through The Trust. This coincided with what was to be a worrying few months for Dizzy, who also had some health issues, both requiring major surgery!

Almost as soon as we took her in full time she underwent a hysterectomy which was a risk at her age; she was almost 12 at this time. Thank goodness The Trust paid all the vet bills! Having got over this amazingly, a few months later I started to feel several lumps. The vet confirmed that they were tumours and would have to be removed. Again she had surgery and made a full recovery.

In a few days she approaches her 15th birthday. She continues to defy all odds. When out for a walk people are amazed, everyone thinks she is almost half her age! She is the sweetest natured dog I have ever known and we were always cat lovers, but Dizzy has completely taken over our lives, enriching it beyond belief. She is thoroughly spoilt and loves her special diet of chicken breast and white fish. She eats better than us, especially considering she only has 2 teeth!

Every time someone comes to the door she assumes they are there to see her! She has a bed in the conservatory, dining room and lounge as well as her shared one upstairs. Whether we have her for another week, month, or fingers crossed a few years, she has left a mark on our hearts that will be with us until our dying day. Who would have thought when I volunteered for The Trust after speaking to a friend on holiday who was already a registered walker, that this gorgeous Yorkshire Terrier would come into our lives and have the impact that she has.

Early in 2020 we had a few days in Cornwall and went to see some of the team at head office in Hayle as several of them knew Dizzy's story and were dying to meet her, she loved it as they did her. We were also extremely honoured to be invited to spend an hour at Poldarves Farm Sanctuary. What a place! We absolutely loved it and cannot praise the team there highly enough. This was somewhere that we didn't know about and, had it not been for Dizzy coming into our world, we never would have! For that, and all the amazing work they do, we cannot thank or speak highly enough of The Cinnamon Trust."



Diane Barlow in Cambridgeshire remembers **Sammy** and introduces **Clarity**.

"In the spring of 2009, I was contacted by The Cinnamon Trust, to ask if I could foster a male cat called Sammy who lived not so far from me in Ely; sadly his owner had recently died.

A few days later he arrived. He was a beautiful cat, with tabby and white markings.

By the evening he had investigated all the house, and 'sussed out' his comfy places.

I never knew his actual age, but the vet guessed he was around 5 years old.

He soon settled me into 'his routine' and from early on I could see he was very much an outside cat, he certainly did not like being housebound for the first few weeks.



When Sammy was allowed out into the garden, he showed me what a great climber he was, up the trees in my garden, over fences and onto my neighbour's garage roof. Sammy wanted it known that he was the new kid on the block and caused issues with some neighbouring cats that cost The Trust some hefty vets bills! It was decided that in order to restore harmony within our neighbourhood and to avoid any more angry knocks on the doors from my neighbours, Sammy had to be 'contained' within the garden!!

It was decided by The Trust that they would put up 'roller poles' erected on top of our fencing. The firm who undertook this venture spent quite a few days getting it all erected and on the fourth evening they left, saying "now, Sammy is quite secure and cannot escape!!!" The fitters had not long left when I went out into the garden to inspect their handiwork - only to find Sammy on the other side of the roller poles hanging on by his claws, his expression "and you were saying?" He also managed to escape by scaling the very sharp, prickly Pyracantha tree against my neighbour's garage and onto her roof! The company could not believe it and I think Sammy taught them a thing or two about the failings of their system. He should have got commission really.

As the years passed Sammy became more content with his own territory, also perhaps feeling his age! He stopped trying to break out of the garden and settled into old age gracefully (sort of)!

Finally in the spring of this year Sammy's health caught up with him, and he became very poorly. So by mutual agreement it was decided for Sammy to be put to sleep by the vet that had looked after him over all the years. In spite of all the COVID restrictions, I was still able to hold him on my lap in the vet's small garden while he was put to sleep. I will always be grateful for that.

His life with me was a series of adventures, there was never a dull moment and I like to think he enjoyed a good quality of life, knowing he was loved so much. He

certainly left a huge Sammy size hole in all our hearts; he was a very special boy.

I am so very grateful to The Cinnamon Trust for all their support of Sammy, just knowing they were at the end of the phone was a huge help.

And now I have another little feline companion called Clarity, fostered for The

Cinnamon Trust. She is 14 years old and a very different temperament; at the moment quite a nervous girl, but gradually settling in. In spite of her age, she flies around the house, but is also quite content just to stay in the garden and not climb!!

In the last week she has felt brave enough to come and sit next to me on the recliner chair on the leg bit! So. I am just letting her 'do it all in her own time' as she had only ever known one owner, who sadly had recently died. Being moved from the one home you



have ever known to a strange home and 'carer' takes more than a bit of getting used to, but she is a very sweet and gentle girl. A very different character to Sammy, but they are all different aren't they?

It is nice to have another little companion in my life."



Gladys lives with her brother Stanley and David and Ann Bawtree in London; she has many talents and she wrote to us:

"Dear Everyone at Cinnamon,

My brother Stanley and I are wondering how you are faring in these changed times. The staff have often spoken fondly of you and are hoping very much that you are well.



Life here has not changed much here with this COVID thing. I cannot get to Music College of course, but I practise my scales and coloratura almost as soon as I awaken, and then at frequent intervals throughout the day until I fall into bed with the staff at night time. First off, I now have to endure a daily brush and comb of my coat. I have been kitted out with a high-viz jacket for the rain and to make sure I can be seen clearly around the farm - very hot on health and safety we are! Next, I try to find the ginger



cat Tom, also called Tom Tom. I terrorise him every day, he is not fussed about me, but I bark at him anyway. He lives in a field shelter, sometimes I drink his water and monitor him through the window.

Then Steve and I go out onto the farm and first thing I do is visit a local celebrity and our next door neighbour; his name is Colin and he is an alpaca. He tells me that he is famous because he appeared in The Cinnamon Trust newsletter, front page no less! He could not believe it when I told him I came from The Cinnamon Trust; what a coincidence! 

Jenny Wallis writes from Cambridgeshire, movingly and with so much appreciation for all her volunteers:

"Although I have a genetic condition which affects my cartilage and ligaments, I never for one moment thought it would prevent me walking my beautiful Labrador, Willow. After my husband died in 2018 she was my reason to get out of bed each day. We would walk for 4 or 5 miles each morning, no matter what the weather threw at us. Willow doesn't mind rain, although she does get a bit irritated by the raindrops falling on her eyelashes, so we had to keep stopping so she could rub them off with her paw! Sadly, late last summer, my condition worsened in my right foot and finally my consultant told me I had to give up walking Willow. I was heartbroken.

Fortunately, a friend of mine suggested I contact The Cinnamon Trust, and what



life savers they are! I have some amazing dog walkers and they are all lovely friends now as well. My first was Susan, who had had King Charles Spaniels.... a bit of a difference to a fully grown, albeit slim, Labrador! Susan just embraced the challenge and it was amazing. Sadly, unrelated to walking Willow, Susan broke her collarbone. But, undaunted, she roped her husband, Peter, into Willow walking. Unfortunately as lockdown ended Peter had to return to work overseas. However, we remain in touch as friends.

Janet, John and their Bernese puppy, Toby, have also been brilliant. I like to think that my 4 year old

(bouncy!) Lab helps to calm Toby slightly whilst walking together on the lead, although, my guess is, not! They too have been incredibly kind and always willing to help.

Then Meghan and her daughter Ellie came on the scene. Ellie wants a dog of her own, but just can't have one yet so mum, Meghan, decided that this was a good training ground for both Ellie and Willow! They too have been amazing and continue to be. They send me lovely photos of Willow, usually with Ellie cuddling her or stroking her tum.

Melissa is the newest of our walkers, but is yet another lovely caring person who Willow adores, and I know as time progresses she will also become another really good friend.

Then there's Rachel. She has her own Lab, Dillon, and despite Dillon obviously feeling that Willow is most definitely over the top, it didn't take him long to accept her - he keeps Willow in check if she bounces too much! It's been good for them both and apparently they walk well together and I'm hoping they will form a firm bond. Rachel has enormous patience!

A few days ago my son said he was worried that I couldn't afford to keep paying for someone to walk Willow so I explained The Cinnamon Trust to him. My 12 year old grandson said "oh Granny, isn't that amazing that in this day and age, there are people like them who care so much they volunteer to help you and Willow". I think that sums up the amazing army of volunteers. Thank you all so very much: without my beautiful dog walkers I don't know what might have happened."

Rachel Ashley-Caunt adds her view:

"I am proud to have been a dog walking volunteer with The Cinnamon Trust for

over 13 years, and feel lucky to have fond memories of time spent with all of the dogs and their owners during this time.

In 2019, I found myself taking on a whole new responsibility when the owner of a dog I was regularly walking very sadly passed away. He had made arrangements with The Trust and they knew the owner's wish was for Dillon, his gorgeous black Labrador, to live with me!

When I received an email from The Cinnamon Trust recently asking if I could help with any dog walks - and read on that Willow was a female black Labrador, who lived close by - it seemed meant to be. Dillon's only socialising has been with my family's dogs who are a fraction of his size, and he is far from keen to make friends with them (finding small dogs most intimidating), so I had wanted to him have a friend his own size.

I asked Willow's owner if she would be happy if Willow and Dillon were walked together, and we all thought it could be great for them.... and it couldn't have gone better! Dillon now has a fellow black Lab 'girlfriend' to socialise with each week, and Willow gets to join us on our long, morning walks over the fields. We all look forward to our regular walks and it's always lovely to catch up with Jen, her owner."

Pet Friendly Care Homes

Pat Piggott is Manager of Cambray Court, a purpose-built retirement home close to the centre of Cirencester in Gloucestershire. She came up with some

innovative ways to ensure the residents of the care home kept up to date with the antics of her dogs who had to stay home earlier this year. **Prince** and **Flint** regularly accompany Pat to work and were badly missed by residents when restrictions meant they had to stay at home. Undaunted, Pat decided the show must go on and turned them into stars of the small screen with videos made on her phone.

"In the end I was making videos every day, one story from each dog, with their picture and a funny voice, to keep the residents up to date on what the dogs were up to," Pat told us.



While her own dogs are busy dealing with their fans, Pat holds audience in her office for the residents' dogs. "We have Poppy, a miniature Schnauzer, Rosie, a Shih Tzu, and Megs, a Jack Russell mix, who visit me the most, sometimes four times a day! Our newest recruit is Staffordshire Bull Terrier Missy, who brought her owner over with her the other day to bring me a refreshing ice lolly to say thank you for the nice treats! They are all beautiful loving dogs, bringing me and their owner's joy and company. I love it!"

Barbara Gates is 84 years old and moved into **The Malt House Residential Home** in Gillingham, Dorset earlier this year. It was a big decision as she had lived in her cottage a couple of miles away for 51 years. This was made easier for her



as she has been able to keep her beloved Papillion, **Star**. Having Star with her has been a great comfort and an ideal ice-breaker with other residents. All of them love her and she follows Barbara around everywhere, making friends as she goes. Barbara said "If I couldn't have brought Star I'd still be in my cottage".

As she is in a wheelchair, Barbara has not been able to walk Star so she contacted us to ask for help.

Pat and Robbie were not the only new arrivals at Elton House; baby chicks were hatched under the watchful eye of both staff and residents!





arrival has given Smash and Grab a new lease of life! They both came out to greet her on her arrival and have become more active and seem to be enjoying their outdoor space a lot more.






Speedy loves her warm baths and she also likes to snack in the bath! She looks for you to hand feed her (of course) and we are only too happy to oblige.
