

#### **Volunteer Views**

#### Louise Round writes from Norfolk:

I started volunteering for The Cinnamon Trust over a couple of years ago during Covid, as I thought there might have been an increase in people needing help with their dogs during that difficult time.



Bindi the Terrier is my second Cinnamon Trust dog and she's a total sweetie. As soon as I met her, and her owner Poppy, I knew that we were going to get along famously. Bindi is a gorgeous little rough-coat Terrier, with a wonderful temperament. She was a little shy when I took her out for the first time, but by the end of the walk she was jumping into the nearby river and barking at me to throw a stick for her. Our friendship was sealed when she finally took a treat from me.

I've been walking Bindi for a few months now and, not only do I look forward to seeing her

every week, it also gives me the chance to catch-up with Poppy - and I love our chats. I know that I'm helping Poppy and Bindi with my volunteering for The Cinnamon Trust, but it also gives me an enormous sense of wellbeing. My life is much richer for having them both in it.

How lucky am I!




**Liberty Strang**, part of the wonderful team at our **Hillside Sanctuary** in Devon writes:

# Rosemary and Robert Harvey from Dorset:

Extract from an Interview by The Sherborne Times featuring our volunteer Rosanna Harvey and Mandy Scott from The Cinnamon Trust

"I first volunteered for The Cinnamon Trust when we lived in Surrey and was working full-time in London," explains Rosanna, a former Civil Servant who has lived in Westbury, Sherborne, with her husband Robert for the past ten years. "I grew up with dachshunds and always wanted a dog of my own but could never make the commitment because of my hours. When we moved to Sherborne I knew I wanted to carry it on, not just because it's good exercise but because it's a great way to meet people. I'll pop in for a chat over a cup of



tea and a slice of cake, and if you've been walking their dogs for a while you develop a friendship."

Rosanna's work for The Cinnamon Trust has also meant that she and her husband Robert have grown to know the area well. "When we first moved down, I'd get out the Ordnance Survey map, stick a pin in it, and say, "OK, let's take the dog for a walk there," says Robert, a former cartographer. "The walk at Thornford across the meadows has become a firm favourite – all the dogs love splashing about in the river. And, of course, we enjoy walking down by the Castle when it's not too muddy."

Today, despite gathering thunder clouds, Rosanna is off to walk Tasha, an affectionate ten-year-old black and white working cocker with doleful eyes and a sure contender for Sherborne's waggiest tail. Grabbing a lead, a handful of dog treats and checking her coat pockets for poo bags ('Handbags, pockets, purses... they are stuffed into every orifice!'), she knocks on the front door of her neighbour, Peter, who turned to The Cinnamon Trust for help when his wife developed dementia.

"Knowing that Rosanna can give Tasha a nice long walk is a comfort because I'm unable to leave my wife alone for any length of time," says Peter, who moved with his wife to Sherborne three years ago from North Devon. "Tasha always returns tired but happy after her walks up at the Terraces, and then will sit happily on the sofa next to my wife for hours. She's the best carer."

This sentiment is echoed by fellow Sherborne residents Sue and Chris, who enlisted Rosanna's help when Sue had a three-week spell in Yeovil Hospital. The proud owners of two-year-old Coco, a cuddly, sweet-natured labradoodle with a beautiful 'just- stepped-out-of-the-salon' blonde coat, heard about The Cinnamon Trust through Reverend Lesley McCreadie, and were impressed just how quickly the team was able to spring into action. "It was just short- term but it meant I could relax knowing that Coco had three good one-hour walks a week" says Sue, a former nurse. "Coco had a wonderful time going on lots of long walks with different volunteers – it got to the point when she had her own engagement calendar!"



## From Mandy at The Cinnamon Trust

"One of the key things The Cinnamon Trust is able to give the elderly dog owner', says Mandy, 'is time – time to recuperate properly without the stress of worrying about their beloved pet. They might have lost the ability to walk because of a fall or have mobility issues, but whatever it is, we take the pressure off them. As soon as they've put the phone down from us the stress just lifts and for the

housebound, it really opens up a whole new world because they get to see new faces.'

'We do our best to match the dog to the walker. When the owner signs up we take time to find out about their pet – their quirks, their routines, whether they're a sniffer or a plodder. If the volunteer is looking for a ten-mile hike, for example, a constant sniffer won't be for them.'

For Rosanna, plodders, sniffers, sprinters are all welcome. Just me, the dog, the beautiful Dorset countryside and, at this time of year, a lot of mud!' A massive thank you to Claire Bowman for the feature and the lovely photography by Katharine Davies.



#### Michael Bonds from East Sussex writes:

Little Lucky was born in Devon almost 16 years ago. He was the fourth yorkie belonging to my now deceased partner and came up to live with me in 2010.



Up until then I had always had golden retrievers and for a few years. George, my Goldie, and Lucky coexisted quite happily, with Lucky very much in charge. Lucky had a nice life up here and along with George, he had plenty of walks in the woods opposite my house and the bordering golf course. Also, The Ashdown Forest of Winnie the Pooh fame, is just around the corner. They got on fine together with frequent trips in the car to other nearby beauty spots. My partner was quite happy about it but Lucky quickly became "my dog" and regarded me as his master and protector, coming to me, when he needed a cuddle.

On Christmas Day 2020, I unfortunately suffered a major stroke and was carted off to hospital.

Because it was Christmas Day, my daughter was staying overnight and was in the shower when she could hear Lucky barking. Lucky could see that I was in distress and his barking alerted her and enabled a quick ambulance call which is very important with a stroke. My family looked after Lucky and he got lots of attention, after a month, he was back home with me.

Now Lucky is getting older: his tongue hangs out of his mouth due to lack of teeth; he is deaf and cannot see too well. However, he is still sprightly and gallops across the garden to meet me. He is eating well on his chicken diet, sleeps a lot and gets me up in the middle of the night. We still manage a short walk every morning.

I am 91 and we must consider the future. Hopefully, we both have a little bit more left in the tank but I felt I had to make sure my little hero was safe in case anything happened to me. So, I have turned to the marvellous Cinnamon Trust for future help and have been most impressed by the service they offer.

As neither of us are getting any younger, and having recently had some health scares, we started wondering about what would happen to our dogs if the worst happened.

This worry built to a point where we were starting to think more about what might happen than enjoying the company of our dogs.

We had been members of The Cinnamon Trust for a number of years and every year buy their Christmas cards to send to friends and relatives. After seeing the information about profiling in the last



newsletter, we decided to find out more about the service and got in touch.

The first question was of course "what would happen if we become unable to look after our dogs"

Compared to other organisations providing dog care we preferred The Cinnamon Trust approach as they not only offered temporary care but long term care if needed. We now feel confident that our dogs will be well looked after.

Teddie our delightful lively cockapoo bounced into our lives just after my 70th birthday. Graeme and I had been retired for 12 years prior to Teddie and had spent much of that time travelling the world with rucksacks on our backs feeling so fit and free. We were lucky to be able to do all of that, the world seemed a safer place and we enjoyed good health.

When Teddie bounded into our lives I found that I did not want to leave him so we bought a motor home which my husband referred to as the most expensive dog kennel in the world. We were more than happy to spend more time



at home as well as explore the British Isles in our motorhome. Teddie loved it and soon made friends everywhere we went. We even managed a long trip through Spain with Teddie.

Sadly after a couple of years it became apparent that Graeme was struggling, and Graeme was formally diagnosed with Alzheimer's. How The Cinnamon Trust has helped me - a volunteer's story.

One of the reasons I joined (and adore) The Cinnamon Trust is that I firmly believe animals are family and that being able to remain with them, or at least know they're going to be safe and happy, is the greatest gift you can give to their human.

The other is because I love dogs and cannot have my own, but now I have Gracie



my spectacular Cinnamon dog who has been walking me regularly for about five years and we are the best of friends.

At home my family consists of me, my precious guinea piggies Teasel and Truffle (two of a long chain of rescue pigs going back about 20 years!), and my beautiful Pacific Parrotlet, Sophie. I cannot even tell you how much they mean to me, they make every minute I'm with them an utter joy, even if I'm

having an absolute rotter of a day, they'll make it better! So I can think of nothing more heart-breaking than being forced to be away from them, and not knowing what may happen to them if I became seriously ill or died was something that really kept me up at night worrying.

Now, guinea pigs are fairly common and easy to rehome if you've got a considerate and loving person who knows the way of The Pig, but parrots? Well, since becoming a birdie mamma I've put aside any thoughts of going on vacation or even being away



longer than half a day. Having a parrot is often compared to having a flying toddler equipped with bolt cutters - and this is true no matter the size, their intelligence and capacity for mischief knows no bounds!

You have to change your whole life to suit them because lots of normal household things are deadly to birds. Parrots are wonderful but they are complicated and demanding, they can suffer serious depression if not loved and entertained every day. So as you can imagine I would frequently worry about just who could look after Sophie if needed.

That's why I signed up to The Cinnamon Trust's service to care for my animals if the worst happened, and I can now be sure my precious little babies will always be safe and loved.

It was so quick and easy too! I spoke to the delightful Debbie, who took information about all my furry and feathered family to make profiles for them and was sent emergency cards to keep with me and put in my home, which will make sure they can be protected and cared for immediately with minimal disruption to them. Then it was just a simple matter to include the instructions within my will, as The Trust had provided pre-prepared wording.

I also decided to make them the beneficiaries too, because whilst I don't have much to donate now (besides my time) I can't think of a better use for my very modest estate! This wasn't a condition of signing up to the Cinnamon Trust's service, it was just something I really wanted to do.

When I left the solicitor's office I felt a huge weight had been taken from my shoulders and I have slept soundly ever since!

We all really miss him.






The most beautiful girl Coco from Mum, Janice Brydon




### **Poldarves Farm Sanctuary**

visit was enjoyed by all!








