Tom Llewellyn, a vet from Mansfield, Nottinghamshire tell us his story cycling the country...

Back in 2024 a group of cyclists had a daft idea... who fancied riding from Lands End all the way to John O'Groats, a 1000 miles, in under a week? Well, it seemed a good idea at the time! Fast forward to 2025 and on Sunday 22nd June we left Mansfield in Nottingham at 7am to head to Cornwall.

Monday 23rd June saw a brutal day of riding - we left our accommodation at 6am sharp, and headed in the direction of Bridgwater. Fortunately the weather was kind, with temperatures around 20°C and a decent tailwind, though the quiet roads of Cornwall were unforgiving - short sharp climbs, with equally steep descents into little valleys, and repeat and repeat!

Unfortunately, Tuesday 24th started really badly. After a late night, an attritional ride, and uncomfortably hot temperatures I slept poorly - for around 3.5 hours only. That meant the 165 mile route from Bridgwater to Ironbridge felt almost as tough as the previous day. The route was pleasant enough, climbing the iconic Cheddar Gorge with its wandering feral goats and crossing both the Clifton Suspension Bridge and the Severn Bridge as we entered Wales briefly before riding on to the Midlands.

Wednesday 26th was always going to be the biggest day. We set off in the light rain for Carlisle at 6:15am though thankfully it dried pretty soon after. We followed our route through the suburbs of Wigan and Manchester and then disaster struck -the road was closed due to roadworks and the bridge was gone. Time



was getting short so I adjusted my route plan and followed the West Coast route. As I rode through Carlisle centre I saw a chip shop... I was in there like a flash, and ate a portion of chips like I'd never been fed.

Thursday 27th was an easier day - only 150miles! - from Carlisle to Cranlarich. We got word from Bob, our superb support driver, that the only hotel in Cranlarich stopped serving food at 9:30pm - it was 6pm and we had 60 miles to do with a massive climb at the end! Powered by paracetamol, ibuprofen and Rocky Caramel biscuits, we whizzed up Loch Lomond through stunning scenery and flew up the final climb, arriving by 9:20pm.

Friday 28th was 145miles of what I know is stunning scenery - it just wasn't visible to us! While that put a dampener on the already damp day, unbeknown to me my wife had made contact with a pal from Edinburgh Vet School that I hadn't seen in nearly a decade who lived near Inverness and Ali was waiting for me by the roadside near Dingwall (with chocolate in hand!).

Saturday 29th was our final day - destination John O'Groats - only 125 miles away! The weather was good with a howling tailwind, and spirits were high after a full night's sleep and a hearty breakfast. We arrived at the signpost around 6pm and had a well deserved drink in the pub, spent a small mortgage on gift shop stuff for my wife and the kids, then headed to the hotel. The end of a once in a lifetime adventure.

That week I covered around 980miles and did 16,700m of climbing (almost two ascents of Everest from sea-level). I'm pleased that my efforts have raised over £1500 for The Cinnamon Trust and I'm so happy that those funds will support the care of some beloved pets!


Between their charity fundraising day and an elegant afternoon tea event, the kind folks of The

Life on the Road

This exciting 40th year anniversary has brought the arrival of our custom made trailer! We have been on the road travelling to different events to spread the word of The Cinnamon Trust and meeting our two and four legged Cinnamon friends. With every new adventure there has been highlights, learning curves and many laughs!

We were lucky enough to debut the trailer at our Big Walk Super Fun Day near our head office in Hayle, Cornwall. It was ideal that we could use our own local event to test out budging it into the correct space and remembering what pole goes where, to open the doors.



Also, in beautiful weather we were able to showcase, although we did realise that standing in the trailer may shelter you from the sun's rays, but you can still go tomato red from windburn, lesson learnt!

At the time of writing this we have now journeyed to four other events: Big Doggie Do in Milton Keynes; Dogstival in The New Forest; Dog Fest at Knebworth House and The Royal Norfolk Show.

Travelling to Big Doggie Do for our first event, was an interesting test with a lot of firsts! After spending a lot of time seeing the beautiful photos on the sides of our trailer in the wingmirrors I realised why Milton Keynes was known for its roundabouts. On arriving at Willen Lake, the event site, the one way system was not in our favour which meant after a lot of back and forth shuffling we had to recruit the help of the security team to manoeuvre the trailer into place!



After a slightly stressful morning of trailer positioning, stiff bolts, and being rudely taught that with a new trailer, things breaking, falling off, or simply not working, was going to be a hurdle with this event and the ones to follow. But we were all set up, and what an incredible spot we had!

We realised that the high value liver treats we had was making dogs cross fields to get to us, which was perfect to get the great bandana shots however it also meant that we had to give the owners a treat to encourage their drooling companions to move on. Some of our volunteers popped by to see us including Big Walk organiser Zoe Zeliku and it was lovely after so many chats to meet face to face. It was a fun filled weekend and an all-round successful first trip.



Dogstival was our next adventure, we set off nice and early to enjoy a leisurely journey on the Friday. We planned to arrive in time to set up on Friday evening so that we were positioned and ready for an early Saturday start. Trying to be organised and full of good intentions, we set off in good time. Sadly, the trailer had other ideas.

We ended up having to use a trailer medic to rescue us from Exeter services due to a loose wire causing the electrical connection to the trailer not to work. So, after a long stop, our hope of a good arrival time faded and instead, we arrived with just enough time to position ourselves and rush on to the hotel.

Following a frazzling first day of travelling, we woke up bright and early to drive back to Dogstival and what a place! It really was a dog and dog lovers paradise. We were again positioned really well and had a great view of all the fun activities. They had such as a splash

zone and a dog cinema.

On the second day of Dogstival, we had the pleasure of being joined by our volunteers Alex and Jane. We also met so many lovely people, who were interested in The Trust or were already part of the family. Strangely being positioned not that far from the toilets worked in our favour as we were entrusted as a doggy creche for people who needed the loo but came on their own and couldn't take their dogs with them, which for us meant that we could just lap up all the cuddles! We also met the gorgeous Star, who once enticed with a famous liver treat, realised we were fellow hound lovers and then would not leave. She would even try to sit on our laps and visited us the following day for more loving. We arrived home from Dogstival filled with joy and excitement to return again next year.





We travelled to Dog Fest at Knebworth House, for which we had been frantically checking and rechecking the weather forecast due to the threat of storms. We had been so lucky with the weather up until this point that all we could do was pray and be positive that if it did rain it would be another good first for the trailer!

We were delighted to have dry weather for the majority of Saturday, but it was a bit dark and gloomy, which meant we had a steady flow of people and dogs to talk to, but it was not as busy as we had hoped. Then around 3pm the heavens opened, and Dog Fest made the wise decision to shut early. However, Sunday was bright and dry which really showed us why it is a very popular event. We had such a busy day that we looked at each other afterwards as a team and couldn't remember the last time we fully saw each other's faces. What a rush it was and lovely to meet so many people, I'm not sure there are many jobs that allow you to end a day delighted to be covered in fur, slobber and smelling like dog treats. A huge thank you to Tracey, Gill, Gilly and Clare for supporting us on our stand.



Most recently, we have been to Royal Norfolk Show, our furthest journey yet! As with many county shows we knew that this was going to be super early starts and very long days. Initially we were over the moon to see the high temperatures and sun forecast but soon realised, when we found ourselves staring at the cold pressed apple juice stand opposite, that it was time to use the moving shadow of a tree as our shade.

We met some other fantastic charities in the village where we were situated and were able

to connect with some incredible people. Although slower than other more dog-centric events that we have attended we still had a great time. Having Carl, Sue and Jo's help on Wednesday, then Lindsay and Jacqui on Thursday was invaluable. It meant that on Wednesday we had everything we needed all set up and ready to go early. Then on Thursday we were able to pass the quiet periods sharing stories of all of the Forever Foster pets, we have had the pleasure of sharing a home with, between us.

Life on the road so far has been full of happiness! Even the lower moments have been turned into a funny story for future telling. We have been met with traffic, opening the trailer dubiously with one eye closed every time for fear something's broken, hotels with no made up beds and dogs peeing on tablet stands thinking they were posts. But what a joy it has been and how special to be able to travel around meeting so many people who believe in The Trust's mission just as much as we do. Thank you to every person who has come to share their heartwarming stories with us. It has been an absolute pleasure. Here's to the next adventure!



My name is Mary, and I live in Whittlesey alone except for my beloved companion Luna an 8-year-old Labrador x Staffie.

A tale of two charming rascals, from volunteer Sandra in West Sussex

I joined The Cinnamon Trust after I lost my own dog Paddy, just to have some canine contact. That's how I met Star and Bianca, who belong to their owner, also named Sandra.

Bianca is the boss, and likes to go off lead, but does enjoy smothering herself in 'scent' when she can find some! Her speciality is doing a full on 'handstand' or perhaps I should say 'pawstand' when she wees!



Star, her partner in canine crime, and best mate, is the tiniest little black and white long-haired dog, but feisty and confident, ready to take on the largest German Shepherd or Rottweiler if you let her!

They are great friends and really love their walks as well as each other. I am only the Wednesday walker- the girls have different Cinnamon Trust volunteers taking them each day. Sandra is so

For me, it fills the huge gap left by not having my own dog now and gets me out and about walking once a week. We meet and chat to a lot of people locally, and many of them know Star and Bianca, and are full of praise for the work The Cinnamon Trust does in helping both the dogs and their owner to remain together where they belong.

Now we have the lovely words of owner David in Essex...

I am David, married to Loretta (I have forgotten how many years). Let's just say I would marry her again in a heartbeat.

One thing that has kept us together all these years is our love of dogs. We have looked after man's best friend in various shapes and sizes since our daughter was one year old. They have virtually all been taken in either from previous owners or pet rescue centres. It would be true to say they have provided us with untold happiness and joy. One or two have alas caused us a little concern with their determination to ignore our strict instructions regarding 'wandering off.'

There comes a time of course when all dogs journey on to that great dog rest home in the sky but we thank God for their company and faithfulness when in our keeping.

At the moment we have Baily a cross between a German Shepherd and a Corgi (Yes!). One thing is for sure, you never know when a dog will come into your lives. We were on holiday in Southern Spain in October 2016 and arranged to have lunch in a restaurant with some friends who owned a villa nearby. We were shown a poster which said, 'dog requires new home.' We had no desire to take the matter further but before long we were shown the bundle of fluff, and the rest is history. We have to say The Trust have been wonderful. In regular contact and showing genuine concern, we continue to have contact with the three volunteers assigned to us. Our thanks are almost beyond words.



Owner Carole in East Sussex shares her story and we also hear from two of Ben's 'aunties'...

There are not enough words to say how grateful I am that someone suggested Cinnamon Trust to

me. My husband had recently given up golf due to age, and our family thought it would be good for him to take on a dog so they both could take exercise together. We saw a photo of Ben, he was so cute, it wasn't a hard decision but foolishly we thought he would be an older dog. He was just 9 months old but very well behaved.

Everything worked really well for about 7 years then unfortunately my husband started showing signs of dementia. He was getting lost, and it became a problem, especially as I have mobility issues and can only take Ben where I can safely have him off the lead, which isn't near to home.

I looked into dog walking firms but realised we couldn't afford their prices being pensioners. Then someone told me about Cinnamon. I made the call. A very helpful lady told me there were people listed in my area who could maybe help.



Within hours I received a call from Julie, who wanted to come and meet Ben, and by the end of the day Gordon and Jo had been in touch. I couldn't believe my luck. Julie and Jo have been walking Ben now for almost 4 years. Gordon came 3 mornings a week for about 2 years but had to give up due to ill health and again, almost immediately Kari arrived and took on Gordon's three mornings a week, and more when needed. I feel so blessed. They are lovely people. Ben is very lucky having all these "aunties" to take him out and spoil him.

Thank you, Cinnamon, you have enabled me to keep my Ben, who turned eleven in May. It would have broken my heart if we had had to part with him. My husband idolised him; it helped with his illness and now that he has sadly passed away, Ben is my companion. Julie, Jo and Kari are more than just dog walkers to me now. They have been so kind and caring throughout my problems. As I said before I feel blessed so THANK YOU!!

Jo, one of Ben's volunteers adds...

I first met Ben and Carole in May 2021, and we hit it off straight away. Our first walk was just around the block, but Ben was not at all worried by being walked by a complete stranger. I now walk Ben every Thursday after work and love turning up at Carole's to his happy little face.

We usually walk along the seafront so Ben can have a nice run off the lead. But the darker evenings are coming, so it'll just be walks around the local roads for a few months now.



Ben's walkers, or "his aunties" as Carol calls us, have met up with Carol for a Christmas
Afternoon Tea for the past few years. Ben looks a bit confused at first to have us all in the same room but soon loves all the attention he gets.

We spend hours exploring the local woods and nature reserve. The Welsh valleys are full of hills, but Gaia kindly helps pull me up them. My current challenge is to see if I can tire her out with a long walk, but I suspect it might never happen! Emergency Fostering Stories



Sarah in Suffolk talks about how volunteering for The Cinnamon Trust has led to her caring for Jenny recently...

I decided to join The Cinnamon Trust after losing my dog Megan in August 2023. I wasn't ready to have another dog of my own but missed the company of a dog and walks, so The Cinnamon Trust seemed like an ideal charity to join. It would give me the opportunity to walk dogs and helping to

provide peace of mind for the owner knowing their companion is being taken out by someone who cares as much for them as they do!

It was mainly the dog walking that I was interested in but when I completed my application, I also ticked that I might be interested in short term fostering. When I received the email about having Jenny as a short term foster as her owner Mike had been taken into hospital, I was keen to help and delighted that we would be getting a little visitor for a couple of weeks.



The process and communication with The Trust in arranging pick up of Jenny from Mike's neighbour Rachel and conducting the home check virtually was all thorough and efficient. The Cinnamon Trust checked in after Jenny's first night to make sure she had settled in ok and eaten.

Jenny was a joy to have stay. She loved her walks, her food and playing with her toys. We explored the South Norfolk countryside and had some new adventures which we both enjoyed.

Fostering is such a rewarding experience that not only provided a safe home from home for Jenny but also gave us just over two weeks of such a lovely, intelligent and gentle dog who was full of character and charm.



I had imagined how sad it would be part ways and to take Jenny home to her owner Mike, but it was just the opposite. It was so lovely to see

Jenny recognise her surroundings when we got out of the car and run up to the front door and sniff. She nearly pulled me over trying to get to Mike and it was a time of pure joy for the both of them. It was a pleasure to meet Mike and chat about Jenny and seeing them reunited was the best feeling. Mike even said I could come and see Jenny again if I was in the area, which again is lovely.

I would recommend fostering a pet to anyone who is able to. The support that is available from The Cinnamon Trust is excellent and it is such a rewarding experience. I wish Mike and Jenny (and neighbour Rachel!) lot of happy days together and thank them for the opportunity of fostering Jenny.

Thankfully, Sarah looked after my little dog for a couple of weeks and was kind enough to print me some big photos so I could see that Jenny was enjoying herself. It was reassuring to know Jenny was safe and sound with Sarah.

Jenny is back home now and I'm grateful to have help from another volunteer, John, who walks her twice a week for me. John has been helping for a while, and I count him as a friend now.



It was a normal morning start until Angela opened our emails and read one from The Cinnamon Trust with an urgent appeal for help to look after 14-year-old William as his owner Heather was in hospital. We pondered having William as each week we walk 2 dogs for their owners and visit Keith's Mum in residential care, but we decided that we could manage and so we contacted The Trust.

The next day we met William with Heather's daughter Joanne in Kenilworth Park. It was clear that the family were under pressure; Joanne was struggling to look after William as she had two cats, her Mum was in hospital and her Dad was in care. We learnt more about William and Joanne described him as Heather's baby.

We had a bit of a shock when we met William, it was hard to believe, but he was the image of Keith's childhood dog Rainer, he even had the same markings. Poor William looked a bit subdued, but we talked to him and reassured him that everything would be fine. We said goodbye to Joanne, promising her that William would be safe with us, and we walked around the park with him. William was surprisingly fit and active, given his age.



After inspecting our home and garden and finding the settee with blanket suitably comfy, William settled in well for his first night. The following day our thoughts were with his owner Heather, we knew she must be worried about her precious William, so we sent a text from William. "Hi Mum, arrived safely, had a good sniff around, and been lying in the sunshine. I think I will enjoy my holiday here. Get better soon, William"

Everywhere he could, William went with us. He especially liked the fuss he received at the care home; Keith's Mum could not believe the likeness to their old dog Rainer too. William settled into our way of life and was no trouble, but obviously he missed his Mum, so we sent regular texts to keep Heather updated. "Hi Mum, yesterday I went a walk with Boo around the local park then we went to see Keith's Mum. I received lots of love and in the afternoon, I rested on my bed in the sun."

Eventually Heather was able to return home, and as the saying goes all good things must come to an end. We still think about William; he was a lovely guest and a good boy!

Wendy in Hertfordshire shares with us...

It was a typical Thursday until I read an email from Megan asking for short term care for a Cockapoo called Charlie. Charlie's owner was in hospital but due to the nature of the emergency, the length of stay couldn't be determined.

My family used to have a Labrador, who we had to say goodbye to in 2019, so we had been used to

having a dog about the house. I work from home and was able to provide a pet and child free home with a secure garden.

I replied to say that I would be able to help. Charlie was staying with Gill, one of his volunteer dog walkers and with Megan's help we arranged a time for me to collect Charlie. Gill was lovely and let me know about Charlie's quirks and habits. I took Charlie for a walk and then popped him in my car for the 30-minute drive home.

When I got home, I sent a message to his owner so that she knew that Charlie was safe with me and my family. Charlie was super chatty and liked to whine and howl, especially when we gave him

lots of fuss, it was his way of telling us he was loving the cuddles!

Over the weekend, we met my friend who has very friendly dogs. Charlie didn't seem bothered about making new friends, but he did enjoy the walk. Charlie was an ideal reading buddy, cuddling into me when I was reading my book on the sofa. One day my parents popped by to meet our new guest and Charlie loved meeting them. Every day I sent Charlie's owner some photos so she could see that Charlie was relaxed and happy. This meant she could focus on getting herself well, without worrying about her beloved pet being cared for by strangers.



On Sunday, Charlie's owner let me know that she was hoping to be discharged home but had no idea of what time it would be. She asked if we could keep Charlie for one more night, of course I said yes, and arranged that I would take him home when I finished work the next day. Charlie was so happy to see his owner and she of course was overjoyed to have him back.



Would I do it again? Yes, without hesitation! Although to be fair to the rest of the family, my husband and 25-year-old son, I would have the courtesy to ask them first. They really enjoyed having Charlie as well. I also think it really helped his owner to get my messages and know Charlie was perfectly safe and happy.

Cornish volunteer Mark tells us about his time looking after Pickle...

I had a message from The Trust shortly before Christmas asking if I could manage an urgent foster over the holidays into the New Year for a terrier cross whose elderly owner had been admitted to hospital.

We readily agreed as we had no plans to go away. We dropped everything and after a 2 hour round trip we collected Pickle from his home.

We knew our own dog Fergus, a Romanian rescue, would welcome any newcomer into the house, but we weren't sure how Pickle would cope with living in a strange house with another dog. However, we needn't have worried. He settled in from the start and soon got his paws under the table! He and Fergus immediately formed an alliance and were happy to snuggle together on the sofa and bark at the postman in unison! They enjoyed their walks together in their little pack of two.

When it was time for Pickle to return home, we packed up his bed and toys and took him back to his owner who was overjoyed to be reunited with him. Pickle was happy to be home after his little holiday and was so pleased to see his owner.

On returning home we noticed that Fergus was a bit depressed for a while as he was missing his house guest and doggy company, so we are all looking forward to fostering again.

Pickle appreciates his weekly walks with volunteer Hilary; Hilary always lets me know what Pickle gets up to, which is nice. I'd like to say thank you to Cinnamon; it is reassuring to know that Pickle will be well cared for if anything happens to me.



Now we hear from Lynda who writes from Oxfordshire...

I was recently asked to foster Flare, an 8-year-old Welsh Border Collie, while his owner was in hospital undergoing a major operation. Flare soon settled in with my husband Andrew and I, enjoying walks around the village and park. Unfortunately, his toys were forgotten in the packing, so the first day he carried his bed around the house wanting Andrew and I to play with it with him! This was soon remedied by taking him to the local pet shop and buying him a squeaky sheep toy. Well, as I said to him, he is a sheep dog!

After getting permission from Flare's owner and The Trust, Andrew and I decided to have a few days stay in Devon. I found a dog friendly hotel (through the agent PetsPyjamas) in Eggesford. On our journey

down to Devon we stopped in Weston-Super-Mare (half-way between Worcester/Devon) for a walk & lunch. Flare was welcomed into the Bistro Pierre with fresh water & biscuits awaiting. On arrival at the hotel we were told dogs were allowed in all rooms and there was 5 acres of grounds to wander around with the River Raw running at the bottom.

Angie tells us how The Cinnamon Trust helped her and Benji...

Twenty-two years ago, after my late husband Alfie passed way, I decided to do some voluntary work. I saw a booklet in my local doctor's surgery about The Cinnamon Trust. I hadn't heard of them before but decided I liked what they offered. Initially I didn't have many requests for help because people didn't know about the charity in Devon. So, I chose to go to local residential homes

giving talks, delivering leaflets to doctor's surgeries etc. to raise awareness of this wonderful charity.

I moved back to my hometown of Coventry and continued to do a number of voluntary roles, as it gave me the opportunity to meet people and do some good. Again, I found that The Cinnamon Trust wasn't well known in Coventry, so I did a talk about the Charity on BBC Coventry & Warwickshire radio with presenter Vic Minett.

As The Trust grew I started to walk a few dogs for people but unfortunately, in 2020 I was diagnosed with a terminal illness myself. So, I found myself reaching out to The Trust for help with my own little dog Benjie. I profiled Benjie so I could have peace of mind about his future; I was so relieved that Cinnamon will love and care for him like I do.



Cinnamon also organised four lovely ladies, Colette, Rachel, Gina and Amanda who share the regular walking of Benji for me. These ladies have become really good friends to me and often go the extra mile. Without their help I wouldn't be able to keep my furry companion, Benjie, with me. I call them "Benjie's Angels".

Whenever I go out, I always have cards in my handbag and if I see an elderly person out with their dog, I give them a card and explain how The Cinnamon Trust have helped me. I didn't fully realise how valuable and life changing it was to walk someone's dog, until I needed the help myself. I can rest easy now, knowing Cinnamon is there when I need them.



Gillian writes in about her dear Dad and his companion Betty...

Betty was originally my Mum's dog; she'd chosen Betty as a companion for my Dad's boxer dog Zara. My mum wanted a smaller, less energetic, nonshedding dog. Betty turned out to be none of these... in fact the complete opposite of them all!

We lost my Mum just over 7 years ago which devasted Betty and not long after that she lost her boxer sister Zara which left just Betty and my Dad. Betty and my Dad became very close mainly due to my Dad's ill health and having to give up work so they spent all their days together and were devoted to each other.

I walked Betty on a regular basis to help get her out and about for exercise until I had a shoulder injury.

Betty then had regular dog walkers and mixed with lots of dogs, being very friendly and playful, and then spent the rest of her time by my Dad's side snuggling up.

As my Dad's health deteriorated, he had a number of stays in hospital. Unfortunately, Betty ended up having to stay in kennels which she soon adapted to, however she was always so pleased to see my Dad when she was collected and taken home.

One of my customers told me about The Cinnamon Trust and I encouraged my Dad to reach out. My Dad profiled Betty with The Trust but unfortunately, just two months later, he passed away. Betty very rarely left my Dad's side and was there with him when he suddenly passed; it must have been such a shock for her.



Thankfully, my Dad had made plans for Betty with The Trust and had the peace of mind knowing Betty would be loved, cared for, and homed in the best place possible. As much as I love and miss Betty, due to my work and home circumstances, we both knew it wouldn't be possible for me to take her on.



Betty moved to Hillside Sanctuary and has settled in so well; Betty is very good natured and gets on with all the other dogs there. It's lovely when I get updates about how well she is doing. In the last photos I received she almost looked like a different dog; she was so happy and healthy.

Betty's favourite thing is playing ball, and as we've been clearing our family home, we've found balls hidden in all sorts of places!

Forever Fostering Stories





Alice is one of our most recent Forever Fosterers to open their home to a pet in need...

We always knew we wanted to adopt a pet, but we also knew we wanted to do it right. For over a year, we worked on creating a calm, comfortable home with the time and space a new furry family member would need. Once I became self-employed earlier this year, we finally felt ready - and in March, we applied to forever foster a cat through The Cinnamon Trust.

We'd actually discovered The Trust a couple of years earlier when a booklet came through the door of my office. As soon as I read about their mission to make sure that no one's beloved pet ever ends up in kennels, and to find the most appropriate homes when owners can no longer care for them, I was amazed – especially with the continued support they provide to the pet's new family. I brought it home and showed my partner Nile straight away. We both work in the funeral industry, so the charity's work resonated deeply with us. It was clear right then that, when the time came, we'd want to adopt through them. I even kept the booklet in my work bag for over two years, showing it to anyone I thought might be interested. It just meant that much to me.

At first, we weren't open to adopting a senior cat. The idea of falling in love only to face heartbreak sooner rather than later felt too hard. But as the months passed with no younger cats needing placement, we realised how wrong it felt to have a loving home sitting empty while older cats were waiting. We asked The Trust to amend our application to include seniors. Literally the next day, we got an email about Tessa.

A sweet 16-year-old cat whose owner had sadly passed away, Tessa was being lovingly cared for by a family friend who travelled hours each day just to feed and sit with her. The moment we saw her photo; we fell in love. I visited Tessa that weekend while the final paperwork was processed (which is when I took the photo!) and she was so brave, so gentle. She nudged me for scratches, curled up beside me, and from that moment we just knew – Tessa was our girl. The Cinnamon Trust were incredible - efficient, kind,



and clearly committed to matching pets with the right homes. We brought Tessa home just a few days later.

In the three weeks since, Tessa has settled in beautifully. Although she has free rein of the house,

she's made our conservatory her domain, particularly our big pink chair. We've angled it just right so she can lounge and watch the birds outside (we even got a bird feeder just for her viewing pleasure). Our favourite thing about Tessa so far is her meow. We think she may be nearly deaf, so when she wants to communicate - whether it's for food or attention - it's loud and proud. Sometimes she will just wander into the front room, shout a meow, then casually stroll back to the conservatory to fall asleep. It makes us laugh every time.

While she doesn't seek us out for affection yet, she meows to greet us, bumps her head against our hands for scratches, and has just started taking treats - dribbling everywhere at the sight of the Dreamies bag! Just this morning, she got onto both mine and Nile's laps for the very first time and we were over the moon! Adopting Tessa has been one of the most fulfilling experiences of our lives. She has let us in, little by little, and every small moment of trust feels like a gift. We already love her deeply and feel so honoured to be her new mum and dad.

Joyce tells us about how Tibby came into her life and how The Trust helped her...

Our story together began in 2015 when I discovered that Tibby was sleeping rough in my back garden. I made him as comfortable as possible by adapting a rabbit hutch to keep him snug and dry and gave him regular food and water. Over time he came to trust me and eventually he came inside the house where he quickly made himself at home.

A couple of years later, Tibby was totally settled in, so I made the decision to profile him with The Cinnamon Trust. Tibby was used to his home comforts, and I didn't want him to have to sleep rough again, should something happen to me. We spent five lovely years together before I realised that I needed more help and the difficult decision was made for me to move into nursing care. Unfortunately, I was unable to take Tibby with me, which caused me great concern.

A friend of mine suggested it was time to contact The Cinnamon Trust to see if they could help with the situation. From the very first phone call I was put at ease by the professionalism and genuine concern for ensuring Tibby would be found a home that was just as caring and loving as to what he was used to with me. Zoe became my main contact, and we had many conversations that put my mind at ease at this stressful time in my life.

A few weeks later I received a phone call from Zoe saying she had found a perfect home for Tibby in Cornwall with a lovely lady called Wendy. So, within a few weeks the move was arranged, and The Trust organised for Tibby to be collected to begin his long journey and his new life with Wendy in Cornwall. It was an



emotional farewell, but I felt reassured that Wendy was the right choice for him. Wendy and I have kept in touch with photos and messages and it's always a joy to hear how he is getting along.

Without Cinnamon I honestly don't know what the outcome for us would have been. Everyone worked so hard finding Wendy, who loves him as much as I do. I cannot thank them enough and I'm sure if Tibby could talk, he would say the same thing.

Wendy lets us know how Tibby is getting on in Cornwall...

I have always been a cat person. When I was growing up we had Felix, then Tigger, and as soon as I got my own place, I couldn't wait to get a cat. Over the years I was lucky to share my life with Bibs, Mittens, Nippy, Tinkerbell and Thomas. The last two were a mother and son, and when they passed away aged 17 and 18, I thought it wouldn't be fair to get another cat that might possibly outlive me.

I had heard of The Cinnamon Trust from a neighbour, so volunteered to be a short term cat foster Mum. My two short term fosters had completely different characters. The first was completely chilled, straight on my lap, no worries! The second was very nervous, spending the first couple of weeks hiding out on the landing and clearly worried by the change in her life and location. Over time she settled well, and by the time she went on to her permanent home she was affectionate and enjoyed sitting on my lap for the whole evening.

Friends asked me if it was difficult handing back these short term visitors just as I got to know them and formed a friendship with them? But I didn't feel like that. I loved having them around, helping them to feel secure and settled. I felt like I was giving them a holiday until their new, loving Forever

Foster home was found.

Whilst waiting for a new short-term foster friend, I was told about Tibby who needed a Forever home. It seemed so sad that he was looking for a home because his owner needed a change in accommodation; I really felt for his owner. I welcomed the opportunity to talk to his 'Mum' Joyce by phone, to find out all about him and to reassure her I would stay in touch and promise to love and care for him. Tibby came to live with me in Cornwall

three years ago; I still remember the day he arrived, I opened up the basket and was met by a pair of big, beautiful, green eyes staring at me.

Tibby was a bit timid at first but soon settled as we got to know each other. Joyce and I talked on the phone quite often in the first few weeks – so that she would know he was settling in happily, and so that I could check that any of his funny little habits were normal for him. He had never used a cat flap, so it has taken a while for him to get used to that. He is definitely a home body – I have never seen him leave my garden. I was warned that he might not be a lap cat, but the opposite is true. He can't wait for me to sit down and is immediately on my lap for as long as possible – definitely fewer household jobs get done because I don't want to disturb him! Tibby is very affectionate, and I love sharing my life with him. I still send Joyce photos and updates and I am very thankful that she trusted Cinnamon and me to provide a new home for Tibby.

Lorraine in North Yorkshire, tells us about taking in bonded pair Truffles and Pumpkin...

I first became involved in The Cinnamon Trust 2 years ago. We had recently lost our beloved little Terrier, Lilly, at the age of 16 ½. My husband and I are both retired and do lots of walking, we were desperately missing our companion! My eldest granddaughter recently entered Pumpkin into a local dog show and Pumpkin won first prize for the fanciest female- she attracted lots of praise as she strutted around in her pink dress! We consider ourselves very lucky in having Pumpkin and Truffles, and I am also delighted to be part of The Cinnamon Trust family and continue to spread the word of their good work when out on my dog walks!

George had been through a lot in his six years, and luckily for us, he had known many Cinnamon volunteer walkers, so he had gotten used to meeting new people and working them out. We were amazed at how soon George settled into our way of life, he seemed to like both of us and didn't mind who he spent his day with, as long as he wasn't left alone. **GORGEOUS GEORGE**

It is a delight to come home to George's greeting, wriggling and wagging, showing you the shoe or toy he has picked up for you... well for himself really! We were also lucky in that we shared most of George's hobbies: playing on the beach, swimming, country walks, meeting people and enjoying a good lunch out! Too old to play in muddy puddles ourselves, George gave us the opportunity to watch this gorgeous boy on cloud nine and we soon gave in to his other hobby, to play catch with toys and balls.

Our only concern about him was that he had come to us without

a dial to control his confidence, as a deaf dog we were worried this could lead to trouble as he has no recall and spends nearly all his walking time with his nose to the ground so we weren't getting very far with sign language. A seed was sown when we thought about how much more we saw of him on walks when out with my step-daughter and her lab, Ernie, thanks



to his recall. Once sure that George knew we were his forever home, we contacted The Trust to suggest he might like a friend.

Enter Barney, another gingernut. Taller than George, nearly half his age and a lot more anxious to be too far from his foster carer, we all agreed Barney would be a wonderful addition to the family. Barney has not even been with us for two months, and already he and George are forever brothers. I'm not going to say best friends because that would be denying that George has the occasional need to do what big brother's do... win every game, instigate rough play and be the one to choose which toys are his... all of which Barney takes in his stride.

Barney and George share all the same hobbies, and to be honest, Barney takes the lead when it comes to intellect and has superb recall, we now see much more of George when out walking. All in all, we know that we are very privileged to be the boys forever fosterer's and they have brought the spring back in our steps, they fill us with joy and never a day goes by when they don't make us smile.

Forever Fosterers Kevin and Alison tell us about Maisie's retirement to Cornwall...

Maisie came to live with us in July 2015, travelling all the way from Yorkshire to Kent, in a carrier perched on the passenger seat of a sports car belonging to a Cinnamon Trust volunteer.

We had been missing a cat, and at that time a dog was not possible due to me working from home as a therapist, meaning lots of strangers coming to the house every day. Being able to take care of an animal, making their lives better, is such a worthwhile thing to do and there are so many animals in need. We jumped at the chance to support a charity like Cinnamon.

The lady who had given Maisie into the care of The Cinnamon Trust wrote us a note thanking us and we sent her some photos of Maisie settling in. We also spoke to her on the phone and were able to reassure her that Maisie was doing fine, that we wouldn't change the name she'd chosen and promised that we wouldn't let Maisie be alone when her time came.

We had no idea what to expect, as we had only seen a photo and it's true to say that there have been dramas and a lot of ups and downs along the way. Maisie was with us for 6 whole years before we discovered that Maisie was in fact, a boy. Went into the vets for some tests as a girl, mid-way through they discovered some unexpected anatomy, came home a boy. We didn't change his name, as we promised. We couldn't think of a suitable alternative anyway. Shouting "in you come Maisie, there's a good boy" does tend to amuse the neighbours too.

Maisie has a reputation. He has broken the spirit of several vet nurses, earning himself the label "Spicy". He's done the "wall of death" in the vet room, broken their scales by kicking them off the table, and memorably emptied his anal glands over the vet who was at that moment checking them. He is a literal cat burglar, using a neighbours' conservatory roof to access their bedroom window. He's terrified a bulldog into crossing the road on his daily walk. He likes to do what he knows you don't want him to do, but only when he has full eye contact with you whilst doing it.



He has learned that if he goes to the French doors, and squeaks, or stands on his hind legs and taps the handle, one of us will get up and let him out. He exploits that by getting you up and then running to what he actually wants. Who has who trained?

Maisie's favourite things are Dreamies, cardboard, cosy fur blankets, Dreamies, his pink toy mouse and more Dreamies. He likes to steal your seat when you get up. He likes to sunbathe outside, preferably in a cardboard box. He used to sneak over to a neighbours' garden and bask in the morning sun on their garden bench. So, we bought him a bench for his own garden. For three summers straight he lay under it, next to it, but never on it.

He gets up as soon as it gets light and is incredibly vocal until you are up too. He has a whole routine of squeaking, chirruping and shouting, coupled with face biting, hair chewing and just straight-out violence until he gets his way. We did try shutting him out of the bedroom, but it was worse. He's grumpy, he's very nosey, and food fussy. In the last few months, he's discovered human food but only apricot yoghurt, grilled sausage, spring water from the tuna can (but not the actual tuna) and chicken but not chicken breast.

Maisie likes a lap cuddle but only on his terms. Woe betides you if you deign to move before he has finished. He snores louder than the TV. If you stroke him when he's not receptive, he will turn around and place his body exactly out of arm's reach.

There have been lots of medical dramas and vet visits – he is on medication twice a day for pain and seizures. When he first came to us, even at a year old he needed a dental, his first of many, and he was treated for toxoplasmosis.

Maisie has become one of the most important parts of our life. When we made our move to Cornwall the house search was as much about how the house would work for him as for us. We

discounted many properties due to the close proximity of a main road or lack of secure outside access. We planned as much for his transition as for the move itself, as he is very sensitive to change and easily stressed. In the end we put him in a cattery before the packing started and he stayed there for a week whilst we packed, moved, unpacked, and drove the 7 hours back for him.

Since the move to Cornwall, Maisie has started to settle into Cornish life, with a slow, structured introduction to his new outdoor surroundings. He adapted to inside quite quickly, as we tried very hard to replicate familiar things – food bowls, water fountain, litter tray all in similar places, blankets covered in his fur draped everywhere. He soon found the best observation points and is currently obsessed with the garden behind ours, more specifically, accessing it over the fence.

Like every animal carer we have so many stories and hundreds of photos. Way too many to write here. Every animal deserves to have a warm, safe home, and crucially one that can meet



their individual needs. We are determined to keep our promise to his first owner, to look after him the best we can and to be with him to the very end. Being Forever foster carers for Maisie is one of the most challenging and rewarding things we have ever done. Thank you, Cinnamon Trust. 10/10 would recommend.



Forever Fosterer Caroline in Hampshire tells about her little friend Zuzu...

My partner Andy and I are lucky enough to be able to call Zuzu our little princess, mummy's best doggie (spoiler: there is only one!), Zulina, and so on and so on, you get the drift.

Zuzu came into our lives around September 2019. I cannot quite remember how I learnt about The Cinnamon Trust, but I am pretty sure it was word of mouth. Having been used to having big dogs in our past, when asked to walk a Toy Poodle, I thought this will be very different!

How right I was! Very different in size but she stole our hearts with her personality from the get-go!

I walked Zuzu for about 6 weeks before her owner sadly passed away. We were then lucky enough to become her Forever Foster home. In a drawer, we have kept the collar and tag her owner bought for her, for sentimental reasons I suppose. He clearly loved her so much and it was very sad.

We love Zuzu so much, she is the apple of both our eyes. She is so loving, so much fun and everyone who meets her just adores her! My favorite thing is to walk her, and we go out twice a day and sometimes more on the weekends. She gets so much love and attention and smiles at

passersby, and I know for a fact she lightens the days of others in this way. I have had someone stop their car on a road to shout "oh my goodness what a lovely dog!" She is so well behaved and adjusted immediately, she seems a very resilient little soul considering the massive life change she had.

The Cinnamon Trust is a truly incredible charity, not just in terms of what they do but how they support volunteers and fosterers and the animal itself through the rest of their days. The staff have been there for us at every step of the way, whether its medical advice or finding cover if we go on holiday and I love sending them pictures every now and then to update on how Zuzu is. They care so much, and this is evident in everything they do.

Whenever I have an opportunity, I talk about The Cinnamon Trust, share social media posts, and put up posters in my local area. It's a small part each person who knows about them can play but it can have the biggest impact in someone's life where this kind of support is needed. I hope that anyone who knows about The Cinnamon Trust will do the same: share, share wherever you can to get the message out. You may never know the positive impact this will have on someone, but it will feel good to think you might be able to help someone else and an animal.


Thank you so much to The Cinnamon Trust for everything and bringing Zuzu into our lives. We all landed on our feet and paws with this perfect match!

Missive sent as follow up to the report...


Dear Smokey Bear Whitechin,



Daisy is 11 years old now and during our time together, if ever I have needed help and support The Cinnamon Trust have been there for us. Whether they have helped sort out Holiday Cover, given me advice about supplements, second opinions on Veterinary decisions, they have been wonderful.

My current experience when I needed them the most, as Daisy has been diagnosed with quite severe skeletal problems and is likely to need ongoing veterinary care has been outstanding and heartwarming. A couple of

days ago, as Daisy was unable to walk on one leg, I dropped her at the vets for a series of x-rays. I was so upset and worried about her, I came home in despair.

I then got a call from Sarah, The Cinnamon Trust Veterinary Nurse, who called to say my vets had been in touch. She completely reassured me and told me they would be there to support Daisy and myself through these health issues. They have agreed to Daisy having monthly injections and will

review any other treatment she might need to make her more comfortable, including complementary treatments like massage, Hydro-therapy, and Pulsed Electromagnetic Field Therapy (which I had to look up!). I feel so very lucky that my little friend will have access to the best possible care available to her.

I now feel confident that Daisy will have the best possible outcome supported by the wonderful organisation, and my local vets have been wonderful too. The working together of my vets and The Cinnamon Trust has been seamless. Thank you Cinnamon and everyone who works there.

Cinnamon Pet Hero



Gorko and Minstrel are very different from each other, and have completely different personalities, habits and likes. There is quite an age gap between them. Gorko is our beautiful, magical black cat, he is nearly eight years old and loves to be picked up and cuddled like a baby. My partner and I are the Forever Fosterers for Cody the saluki, who has been with us now for 2 years. We have really noticed how settled and secure he has become as time goes on. Having initially been rescued from dog fighting as a bait dog, it's been very rewarding to see him become

more secure and confident the longer we've had him.

As with any dog it's his little ways which we find the sweetest- the way he has his favourite spot on the sofa, perfectly positioned so he can see the road outside but also have the perfect back rest; a recent habit he's created where he jumps up under the duvet for a morning cuddle after his dental chew; and his love of sunbathing out on the patio when the weather allows! He is a typical sighthound and can either be super enthusiastic or not even remotely interested when you bring a toy out for him to play with!



We love to take him on adventures with us and highlights over the last year include introducing him to camping which he loves, hiking part of the Fife coastal path, taking him up plenty of hills including some Munros, and also finding a dog friend who could actually outrun him when they were off lead together in a dog park! We are continuing to work on his reactive behaviour and have been introducing him to some local dogs, some pairings of which work but not all the time! It's helped to improve our dog handling skills and learn more about caring for a reactive dog. When he does find a dog, he gets on with and begins to trust it is very rewarding.

The Cinnamon Trust have been a great support; we have used the welfare team a couple of times for their advice and it's always great to know we have the vet advice on hand if we need it. Meet Our Animal Welfare Team



We have a team of highly qualified, kind, and caring vet nurses who are always on hand to help and offer advice for our Cinnamon Pets. We would like to introduce them to you and shine a light on the vital work they do for The Trust.

Hello, I'm Sarah

I am a qualified Veterinary Nurse and The Animal Welfare Manager for The Cinnamon Trust. I have been working for The Cinnamon Trust since January 2016, and I worked directly under Averil which was a huge honour and more than a little terrifying! I was promoted to Animal Welfare Manager in 2022, and my team has now grown to include 3 other vet nurses and our Animal Welfare Admin Assistant Laura. Between us we look after all of our Forever Foster pets and their Fosterers, we assist our Sanctuary Managers with the care of Sanctuary residents and staff training, and we also provide support and advice for Volunteers caring for pets on a short-term basis.

I was always aware of The Cinnamon Trust during my time in practice and we displayed posters in several vets I worked at. I come from a family of animal lovers and at that time both of my

Grandmothers were bereaved following the loss of my lovely Grandads and both had dogs who were incredibly precious to them and provided them with a sense of purpose and routine at a difficult time. Pets are family pure and simple to us; I was very touched by the ethos of The Cinnamon Trust and had seen firsthand how important pets are to their elderly owners. They bring so much joy and comfort and often a well needed chuckle on a difficult day.

My Dad was a Herdsman for several Dairy farms, so I grew up in the countryside surrounded by animals of all shapes and sizes. I loved being with the animals and caring for them and our Aga was always surrounded by piles of various furry bodies, often with a rather pungent aroma! The writing was on the wall for me, and I knew I wanted to be a Vet Nurse from an early age. I went straight from school into Practice via a Modern Apprenticeship as they were then. That was in 1997, and I qualified as a Vet Nurse in 2003.

I worked at several different practices over almost 18 years ranging from a small one-man mixed practice in rural Shropshire to a busy Hospital in Chippenham. I have been lucky enough to work with Birds of Prey, exotic animals ranging from reptiles to Meerkats and Marmosets, Alpacas and various wildlife. I was reaching a point in my Veterinary career where I felt the need for change, and by chance after a crazy morning in theatre and quickly grabbing a stale donut and a cold cup of tea for lunch I came across an advert in the Vet Times for the job at The Cinnamon Trust and BOOM! I just knew in my soul this was where I should be and the rest, as they say, was history.

The past 9 years have flown by, I've learned so much from Averil, other members of our amazing team and the wider veterinary community. It's a privilege to be a part of such an incredible charity and so refreshing that we are able to put our pets needs first, regardless of cost (although that must always be considered responsibly). I have been involved in the lives of so many gorgeous pets and people, there have been many, many highs and a few lows. It can be stressful at times and making decisions can be incredibly tough.

I am currently owned by my elderly, demanding Border Terrier Edie May. I absolutely adore Terriers, the naughtier the better! I love their tenacity and sense of fun. I am also a big fan of Labradors and Springers. I've had six dogs of my own over the years, my first dog was Lucy, a football mad Lab x Jack Russell who was my best pal and lived until she was 16years old. She was a fabulous friend and always looked out for me. My Labrador Dodger came next, he was an ex-Gundog who had been badly treated, he taught me so much and cemented my love of Labs. My next dog was a Patterdale x Schnauzer called Max, now he was some boy! He was ball crazy, an absolute comedian with a heart of gold and very polite and gentlemanly to all creatures. Edie May was my first dog as an adult living away from home and she is my little soul mate. Grumpy, opinionated, and hilarious. A prolific hunter in her youth which led to many embarrassing situations but in her latter years a great lover of the finer things in life.

When I met my Husband, he came with a rescue Springer Spaniel called Dylan. The most

handsome spotty dog you ever did see but my goodness he was hard work and challenged everything I thought I knew about dogs. I realised then that sometimes love is not enough, understanding is incredibly important, and Dylan inspired me to be better and learn more about dog behaviour and emotional wellbeing. I'm the Animal Welfare Administrator. I am a qualified dog groomer, which was my job for 6 years prior to coming to The Trust.

I have lots of experience with different breeds of dogs and am always happy to chat about any

grooming queries or anything else with our fosterers. I always wanted to work for The Cinnamon Trust and when I could no longer work as a groomer, after breaking my back, I jumped at the opportunity to work with the Animal Welfare team and our brilliant vet nurses.

I have three cockapoos at home - Noodle, Cupid and Cherub - and a horse, a Welsh D called Tarka.

We support pets for life!

One of the Cinnamon Pets that the team have been working with recently is Thomas in Wiltshire. Being a Forever Fosterer means you have access to our teams wealth of knowledge and experience. We work directly with vets to ensure that our Cinnamon Pets have the best care; this is the promise we make to each owner that profiles their pet with us.

Thomas is a very beautiful boy, as I am sure you will agree, he is also a sensitive chap. His sensitivity and the anxiety that comes with that sometimes has a detrimental effect on his bladder. Cats are very prone to stress cystitis and for male cats this can become serious.

Thomas always sees the vet for medicine when he has a flare, but by using both a plug-in pheromone diffuser at home to reduce his stress, and by giving him a supplement than helps the lining of the bladder be as heathy as possible, we are minimising the flares and the severity.

This is a win-win for all, Thomas stays feeling as well as he can for longer and we can minimise associated trips and costs to the vets for him. Natural supplements can be a gentle yet powerful way to support your pet's health.





Some of the key benefits:

Joint Support – Ingredients like glucosamine, chondroitin, and green-lipped mussel can help maintain mobility and ease stiffness, especially in aging pets.

Digestive Health – Probiotics and digestive enzymes promote a healthy gut, improving nutrient absorption and reducing issues like bloating or constipation, and can replace healthy gut flora lost through illness such and vomiting and diarrhoea.

Skin and Coat Care - Omega-3 fatty acids from fish oil or flaxseed can reduce dryness and itching, giving your pet a shinier, healthier coat.

Immune System Boost - Natural antioxidants and herbs can strengthen your pet's immune response, helping them fight off illness more effectively.

Fewer Side Effects - Compared to synthetic medications, natural supplements are often gentler on the body and may be less likely to cause adverse reactions.

Holistic Wellness – Many natural remedies support not just physical health but also emotional well-being, helping with anxiety or stress through calming herbs like chamomile or amino acids such as L-Tryptophan.

Harnessing the power of appropriate supplements, at the right time, can be beneficial in minimising both discomfort of a condition, and could have the potential to slow down the progression of a disease process before stronger medications are required or symptoms

become more prevalent.

Here within the Animal Welfare team, we try to approach the pet as a whole and will often use supplements to support a pet either before, or, in addition to the prescribed medication. We provide this to our Cinnamon Pets at no cost to their Forever Fosterers as part of our very generous support package.



As always, Sanctuary life is well lived and loved by all our residents.







Hillside Farm Sanctuary



Ears' competition, the dogs partook in a cucumber sandwich or two, it was great fun!




